- ▶ Why should I get involved?
 - ▶ WAPA needs YOU to stand up for the PA profession and start educating others about what we do.
- ▶ What's the problem?
 - ▶ We must be our own advocates to reduce barriers that reduce our ability to practice most effectively.
 - ▶ Increasingly job postings are listing ARNP only, due to misinformation about what PAs can do and the Physician's role in employing a PA.
- ▶ How do we change that?
 - ▶ We need to educate others in health care with the factual information about PAs from a practice level and legal perspective.

Every PA's Personal Decision: How Much Do I Want to Get Involved?

1. Supervising Physician and other physicians you contact.
2. Clinic/hospital administration/human resources
3. Join County/State Medical Societies
4. Political/Legislative action

Measurements of Success

- ▶ Internal to your practice:
 - ▶ Better understanding of the role of the PA in the Physician/PA healthcare team
 - ▶ Fewer concerns about ARNP only hiring notices
 - ▶ More PA involvement in clinic/hospital staff administration
 - ▶ Increased Physician interest in hiring of PAs
 - ▶ Increased awareness of PA practice regulations
 - ▶ Increased involvement in the efforts of WAPA
- ▶ Outside of your practice:
 - ▶ Increase in PA/ARNP hiring notices
 - ▶ Updated By-Laws and internal regulations related to Physician/PA healthcare team practice
 - ▶ Continued Legislative support for PA practice improvements

Physician's guide to hiring a Physician Assistant (PA)

What is a Physician Assistant (PA)?

A well trained healthcare practitioner who can take medical history, conduct physical exams, diagnose and treat illnesses, order and interpret tests, assist in surgery and develop treatment plans.¹ One valuable attribute of the PA is their flexible role and function within the dynamic physician-PA team.²

How does the Physician/PA healthcare team work?

The PA profession was founded on the concept of team practice which is based on AMA and AAFP guidelines.² Physician-PA teams enhance coordination and quality of care.

How are PAs trained?

PAs are trained using the medical school model and frequently will train side by side with physicians. They complete around 2000 hours of supervised clinical practice prior to graduation. They develop similar medical reasoning skills. PAs think like doctors.^{2,3}

How will PAs fit into my practice?

PAs work in physician-directed teams collaborating as needed with physicians to provide high-quality patient care. They can work in almost all specialties and even remote sites.^{2,3}

Can PAs prescribe controlled substances?

In Washington State, PAs can prescribe Schedule II-V drugs and must have their own DEA number.⁴

What documents can the PA sign?

A PA may sign and attest to any certificates, cards, forms, or other required documentation that the PA's supervising physician or physician group may sign.⁵

Do I have liability/responsibility for the PA?

"The supervising physician and physician assistant shall retain professional and personal responsibility for any act which constitutes the practice of medicine as defined in RCW 18.71.011 when performed by the physician assistant."⁶ It is the responsibility of the certified PA and the sponsoring physician to ensure that appropriate consultation and review of work are provided as per the delegation agreement.⁵

Do I have to supervise the PA?

PAs practice medicine "only under the supervision and control of a physician," which does not mean that the physician must be present in the room, but may be available via telecommunication. Details of the practice arrangement between the PA and their supervising physician be on file with the Medical Quality Assurance Commission or Board of Osteopathic Medicine and Surgery.² It is the responsibility of the certified PA and the sponsoring physician to ensure that appropriate consultation and review of work are provided.⁵

Do charts need my co-signature?

Washington law *does not require* that PA's notes or other clinical documents be co-signed by a physician.² Individual organizations may have different requirements.
